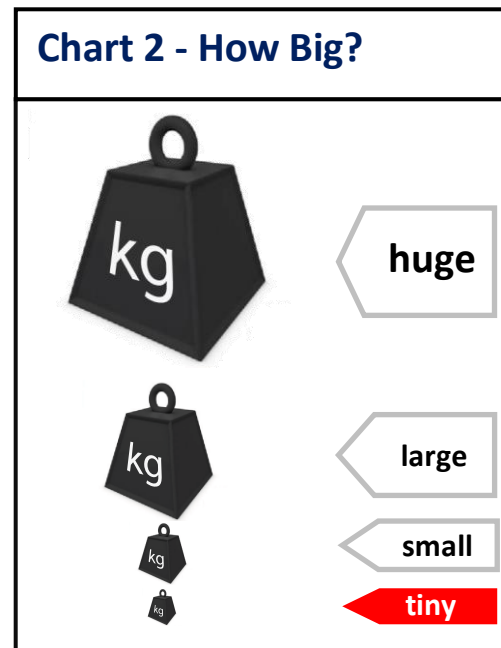
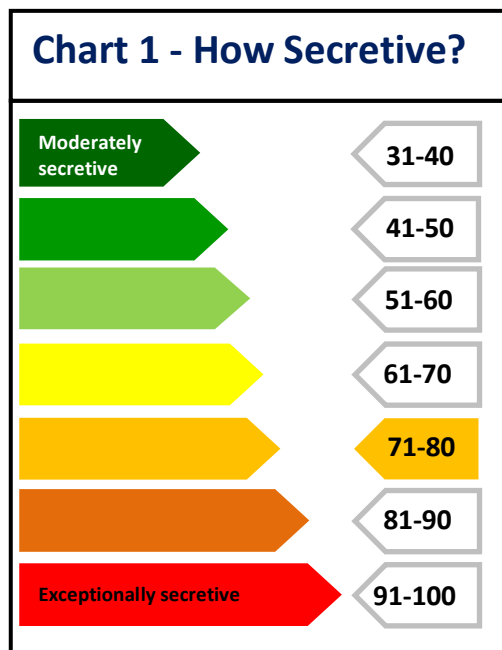


## Report on Costa Rica

Costa Rica is ranked at 46th position on the 2013 Financial Secrecy Index. This ranking is based on a combination of its secrecy score and a scale weighting based on its share of the global market for offshore financial services.

Costa Rica has been assessed with 71 secrecy points out of a potential 100, which places it towards the top end of the secrecy scale (see chart 1).

Costa Rica accounts for less than 1 per cent of the global market for offshore financial services, making it a tiny player compared with other secrecy jurisdictions (see chart 2).

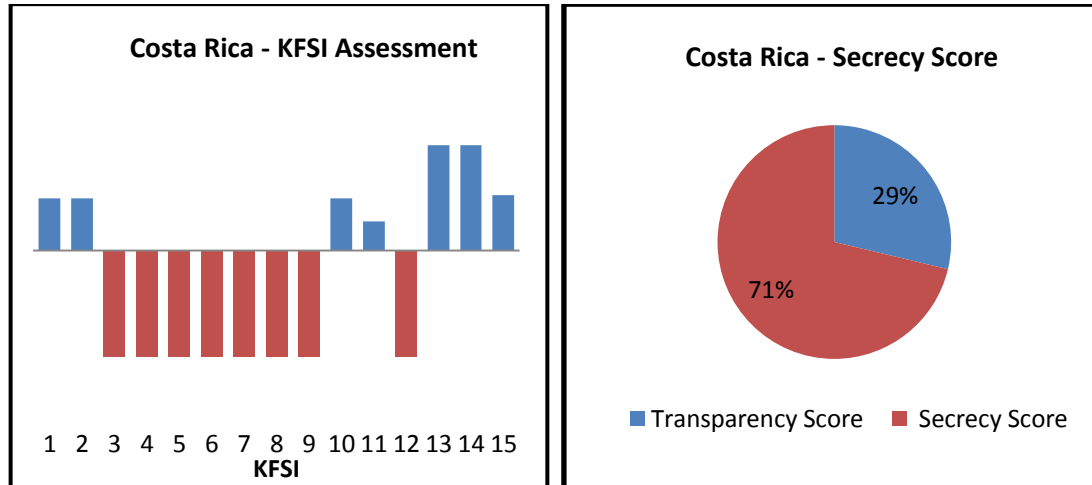


### Next steps for Costa Rica

Costa Rica's 71 per cent secrecy score shows that it must still make major progress in offering satisfactory financial transparency. If it wishes to play a full part in the modern financial community and to impede and deter illicit financial flows, including flows originating from tax evasion, aggressive tax avoidance practices, corrupt practices and criminal activities, it should take action on the points noted where it falls short of acceptable international standards. ## Secrecy Scores

The secrecy score of 71 per cent for Costa Rica has been computed by assessing the jurisdiction’s performance on the 15 Key Financial Secrecy Indicators, listed below.



The numbers on the horizontal axis of the bar chart on the left refer to the Key Financial Secrecy Indicators (KFSI). The presence of a blue bar indicates a positive answer, as does blue text in the KFSI list below. The presence of a red bar indicates a negative answer as does red text in the KFSI list. Where the jurisdiction’s performance partly, but not fully complies with a Key Financial Secrecy Indicator, the text is coloured violet (combination of red and blue).

This paper draws on key data collected on Costa Rica. Our data sources include regulatory reports, legislation, regulation and news available at 31.12.2012<sup>1</sup>. The full data set is available [here](#)<sup>2</sup>. Our assessment is based on the 15 Key Financial Secrecy Indicators (KFSIs, below), reflecting the legal and financial arrangements of Costa Rica. ### The Key Financial Secrecy Indicators and the performance of Costa Rica are:

TRANSPARENCY OF BENEFICIAL OWNERSHIP – Costa Rica	
1.	Banking Secrecy: Does the jurisdiction have banking secrecy?  <b>Costa Rica does not adequately curtail banking secrecy</b>

2.	Trust and Foundations Register: Is there a public register of trusts/foundations, or are trusts/foundations prevented?  <b>Costa Rica partly discloses or prevents trusts and private foundations</b>
3.	Recorded Company Ownership: Does the relevant authority obtain and keep updated details of the beneficial ownership of companies?  <b>Costa Rica does not maintain company ownership details in official records</b>
<b>KEY ASPECTS OF CORPORATE TRANSPARENCY REGULATION – Costa Rica</b>	
4.	Public Company Ownership: Does the relevant authority make details of ownership of companies available on public record online for less than US\$10/€10?  <b>Costa Rica does not require that company ownership details are publicly available online</b>
5.	Public Company Accounts: Does the relevant authority require that company accounts are made available for inspection by anyone for a fee of less than US\$10/€10?  <b>Costa Rica does not require that company accounts be available on public record</b>
6.	Country-by-Country Reporting: Are all companies required to comply with country-by-country financial reporting?  <b>Costa Rica does not require country-by-country financial reporting by all companies</b>
<b>EFFICIENCY OF TAX AND FINANCIAL REGULATION – Costa Rica</b>	
7.	Fit for Information Exchange: Are resident paying agents required to report to the domestic tax administration information on payments to non-residents?  <b>Costa Rica does not require resident paying agents to tell the domestic tax authorities about payments to non-residents</b>
8.	Efficiency of Tax Administration: Does the tax administration use taxpayer identifiers for analysing information efficiently, and is there a large taxpayer unit?  <b>Costa Rica does not use appropriate tools for efficiently analysing tax related information</b>
9.	Avoids Promoting Tax Evasion: Does the jurisdiction grant unilateral tax credits for foreign tax payments?  <b>Costa Rica does not avoid promoting tax evasion via a tax credit system</b>

10.	Harmful Legal Vehicles: Does the jurisdiction allow cell companies and trusts with flee clauses?  <b>Costa Rica partly allows harmful legal vehicles</b>
<b>INTERNATIONAL STANDARDS AND COOPERATION – Costa Rica</b>	
11.	Anti-Money Laundering: Does the jurisdiction comply with the FATF recommendations?  <b>Costa Rica does not comply with international anti-money laundering standards</b>
12.	Automatic Information Exchange: Does the jurisdiction participate fully in Automatic Information Exchange such as the European Savings Tax Directive?  <b>Costa Rica does not participate fully in Automatic Information Exchange</b>
13.	Bilateral Treaties: Does the jurisdiction have at least 46 bilateral treaties providing for information exchange upon request, or is it part of the European Council/OECD convention?  <b>As of 31 May, 2012, Costa Rica had at least 46 bilateral tax information sharing agreements complying with basic OECD requirements</b>
14.	International Transparency Commitments: Has the jurisdiction ratified the five most relevant international treaties relating to financial transparency?  <b>Costa Rica has ratified relevant international treaties relating to financial transparency</b>
15.	International Judicial Cooperation: Does the jurisdiction cooperate with other states on money laundering and other criminal issues?  <b>Costa Rica partly cooperates with other states on money laundering and other criminal issues</b>
